### We Are Supporting Equity In Our Community

Though this difficult time Sotterley has kept two of its signature programs moving forward: our Common Ground Initiative and Growing for Good. In their own ways, these programs strive to improve lives and promote equity on many fronts.

Common Ground went virtual this year, and most importantly all programs remained free to the public. We began a weekly Facebook Live event, "The Big Picture," with Jeanne Pirtle, Director of Educational Programming & Partnerships, and our Speaker Series continues with topics that help us reframe our thinking. In August we held virtual events on Transcending Barriers, and we hosted the second annual UNESCO Day of Remembrance (both live and virtual). In September, special guest Kenyatta Berry discusses our shared past through genealogy. We continued to expand our Descendant's Project, partnered with group the Dismantling Racism in Southern Maryland for The Big Conversation, and became a Museums for All site. We continue to honestly examine our history and our world to encourage understanding and dialogue.

Since 2014, Growing for Good has donated over 60,000 lbs. of produce to local food pantries. In 2020 due to COVID, we were unable to use the incredible volunteers that have helped to plant

and harvest our produce. With the generous support of Sunflower Property Maintenance, Bayside Auto Group, Buckler Electric, Winslow Pump & Well, and Wally's Excavating, the program has continued during a time when it is needed most. We will donate another 6,000 lbs of produce this year, and we have begun to expand the project in two new ways. With the addition of 50 acres from our Wildlife Enhancement Program, we began to harvest hay to donate to several beef farmers. We coopted with these farmers to donate beef to local food pantries this fall and winter, with a goal of expanding this program over the next 36 months so that 10,000 lbs. of beef can be donated each year. In addition, 5 1/2 acres of mixed grains were harvested this year and will be manufactured into bread at local FDA approved bakeries. It is estimated that 400 loaves of bread will be donated to food pantries from this new part of Growing for Good.

Despite the pandemic, through Common Ground and Growing for Good, Sotterley has continued its work to promote social, racial and food equity. Each of you who has supported us during this challenging time have made these efforts possible. Thank you, and know that with your support, our important work together continues!
