

Common Ground, Connected Heritage Our American Family April 19-21, 2018

Historic Sotterley connects to generations today through the stories and lives of its past. As members of this community and nation, we seek to understand ourselves through looking at the history, art, culture, and stories that highlight our different perspectives, experiences, and our human commonness. We invite descendants and the public to Our

American Family, a multi-day event as part of Sotterley's Common Ground, Connected Heritage project funded by a grant from Maryland

Humanities. Through presentations, panels, discussions and tours led by subject matter experts in art, education, history, social justice, research, genealogy, theology and sociology, participants will have the opportunity to come away inspired and equipped with tools needed in today's ever changing world. Participants will be able to meet and hear the stories of Sotterley descendants who bring a wealth of diverse knowledge and insight on universal human themes at the site where their ancestors walked. Sotterley recognized in April by the Maryland Historical Society for Excellence in Public Programming for its Slave Cabin Exhibit

When Sotterley first opened as a museum, the tour focused, in traditional Colonial Revival style, on the main house and its furnishings, and the owners. In the 1970's, Agnes Kane Callum, a Sotterley descendant through her enslaved ancestors, made known her genealogical and historical research. Lo and behold, there were slaves living here too! As with other museums such as Mount Vernon, Montpelier and Monticello, research at Sotterley has allowed for re-interpretation and the expansion of its narrative. The house and its owners were now coupled with the story of the slave cabin and the enslaved who lived at Sotterley. Nothing is as powerful as experiencing the reality of the Slave Cabin itself. Sotterley realizes that allowing visitors to enter the cabin to experience the reality of enslaved life is an important step. The exhibit, designed by Sotterley's



Education Director, Jeanne Pirtle, is an accurate portrayal of a part of Historic Sotterley's story, and the story of America, that has been ignored and hidden. The Slave Cabin, largely unchanged in appearance, offers a window into the lives of slaves in the decades just before the Civil War. Headroom in the single first-floor room is low, and above is an attic used as a sleeping area. The floor is dirt and there is a brick fireplace used for heating and cooking. Visitors to the slave cabin and exhibit perceive its diminutive size, smell the dirt of the floor, see the sparse and simple furnishings, and get a glimpse into other lives and perspectives. Seeing life at Sotterley through another's experiences helps them comprehend the disparity between owners and the enslaved families that supported them, bringing relevance to these discoveries today.

Saving History:

The Urgency of Preservation

A new exhibit, based on the importance of historic preservation, opens April 18, with a reception and program at 6 pm. Call the office to RSVP. The exhibit will feature the story of Resurrection Manor, an early manorial grant in Maryland, and the principal historic building on this manor. Designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1970, this building was demolished for development. Sotterley is located on the original Resurrection Manor land grant and the history of Resurrection Manor and Sotterley are intertwined. The exhibit will incorporate artifacts from the original Resurrection Manor, and a timeline of photographs will clearly illustrate the decay and deterioration of this historic dwelling. The exhibit was funded with grants from the Delaplaine Foundation, The Society of Colonial Wars, and the Brown Family Fund.

Food for Thought-Donald Barber, Sotterley Trustee



My connection to Sotterley provides a touchstone in an increasingly impermanent world. I remember the place my father pointed out and said "I was born right there." Sotterley is more than a place frozen in time. It is brought to life by its people, their connections, struggles and triumphs. The late Agnes Kane Callum graciously researched my genealogy and presented me the fruits of her investigation. This information, which was completely unknown to me, was made available only through my connection to Sotterley. I also have fond memories of walking freshly ploughed fields with my father and finding Native American projectile points that a historian remarked likely dated from 3000 BC. One can imagine standing on the portico and witnessing a naval battle in the War of 1812.

The preserved slave cabin, located in relative proximity to the manor house, provides an opportunity to viscerally experience the plight of the enslaved in America, being so close to but denied access to the bounty available in this land. The history of Sotterley is emblematic of the history of the United States and its struggles with ethnic diversity. The value of Sotterley lies in its portrayal of the sweep of American history.

Picturing George Washington: The Man and the Myth April 19, 2018

During his lifetime, George Washington evolved from a military leader into a national icon and ultimately became a living legend. After his death, nostalgia for a lost era of republican virtue and decorum further romanticized Washington's image. This illustrated lecture examines the changing portrayal of Washington from the 1770s through the 1870s, exploring the

way artists have shaped the president's significance in the American imagination. Presidential Picture Stories; Behind the Camera in the White House May 16, 2018

For 50 years as a staff photographer for Black Star Publishing Company, Dennis Brack has covered the administrations of U.S. presidents from John F. Kennedy to Barack Obama, world leaders, U.S. Congress and Supreme Court justices as well as major news stories worldwide. Based in Washington, D.C., he photographed for the Washington Post, Life and Newsweek, and for twenty-three years Time magazine published his work weekly. His photographic career includes photojournalism, advertising and commercial work. He continues to cover the White House and Capitol Hill. In addition to photographs of the U.S. presidency, his archive includes work documenting American military personnel and operations, wars, war protests, key moments of the civil rights movement and riots. It also features his

coverage of public works projects, social issues, human interest stories and entertainment. Brack's photographic work has been recognized by the National Newspaper Photographers Association and the World Press Association. The White House News Photographers Association honored him with its lifetime achievement award in 2012.




