Another Critical Milestone in Interpretation

Another milestone in Historic Sotterley's museum history and mission was made on Friday, April 21, 2017, when over 200 people, to include Sotterley descendants and family members of the Cane, Edwards, Barber, Briscoe (did we have Knott, Scriber descendants?) families, with community members and guests, joined together to celebrate the life and work of the late Agnes Kane Callum. This occasion marked the official opening of Sotterley's slave cabin exhibit that examines the culture, ingenuity, and resilience of Hilary and Al-

ice Cane, the ancestors of Ms. Callum who were an enslaved couple with their children quartered in such a structure in the mid 19th century. The exhibit was dedicated to Ms. Callum's memory. The first African American to serve on Sotterley's Board of Trustees, Ms. Callum was the first catalyst nearly 40 years ago, to recognize and tell the complete and unromantized narrative of Sotterley's existence and reliance on the institution of slavery for 165 years. *Continued on page 3*.

According to Lexington Park Elementary's STEM Fourth Graders, you'd come to Sotterley! Over the past few months, we have hosted Lexington Park Elementary School's STEM Fourth graders. Tammy Belisario, one of the two teachers who joined us, said,

"Our partnership with Sotterley Plantation this year has been a wonderful interdisciplinary learning experience for our STEM fourth graders. During our field trip in October, students were able to participate in Sotterley's *Living on the Patuxent* program to learn the impact that the Triangular Trade Route had on the history of Sotterley, the importance of agriculture in the history of the Maryland colony, as well as touch real artifacts that the slaves and colonists used during colonial times. Throughout the year, students



were able to make connections between what they had learned in class about the lifestyle of the early colonists and slaves of the Maryland colony to what they had seen and experienced at Sotterley. Students were so excited about what they learned that they wanted to let other children know about the exciting opportunities at Sotterley." *Continued on page 4*.

As you all know, our Slave Cabin exhibit was Dedicated in April to the memory of our Trustee Emeritus, Agnes Kane Callum, a direct descendent of slaves who lived and worked at Sotterley. In addition, the Board proclaimed that Agnes' birthday, February 24th, would forever be acknowledged in her honor. She was the first African American Trustee of Historic Sotterley and worked tirelessly to share Sotterley's story with the world. She understood our need to acknowledge our unvarnished past. We will always be indebted to her!

On May 13th we held a fundraiser, "Taste of Sotterley" sponsored by our friend, Rob Plant, and his staff at Elements. Guests walked to different stations on the site for hors d'oeuvres and to receive wine from local "celebrity" pourers.

We are starting our fourth season of our Sotterley Farmer's Market which has been welcomed by the community. Not only do local vendors sell their produce and wares, but Sotterley grows and sells our own organic produce. The produce that is not sold is given to community organizations helping to feed those in need.

Another Milestone in Critical Interpretation (cont'd)

Using her research, family oral histories and tradition that was passed down through her father and grandfather of enslaved life at Sotterley during Briscoe ownership, the lives of her great-grandparents under slavery at Sotterley becomes three dimensional, bringing these people and their stories to life. Ms. Callum joined forces with owner descendant, Judge John Hanson Briscoe, over 20 years ago to save Sotterley from dissolution when the site was listed as one of the 11 Most Endangered

historic sites in the nation. Putting aside her personal pain and trauma that she experienced in coming to grips with Sotterley and her family's history, she formed a friendship and worked alongside Judge Briscoe for the greater good. She knew and always believed that knowing one's history was important in empowering and equipping us all for a more equitable and promising future.

Some of the most notable moments of the ceremony were speeches by Ms. Callum's surviving sister, Edna Martina Kane Aiden, and Ms. Callum's children, Agnes Callum Lightfoot, Dr. Martina P. Callum, and Martin

J. Callum. A heartfelt speech by owner descendent and Sotterley Board Vice-President, Janice Briscoe, acknowledging her ancestors' roll in slavery, and a Board Proclamation making February 24 Ms. Callum's birthday, as Agnes Kane Callum Day, was not only a loving tribute but highlighted Historic Sotterley's commitment to this important mission and interpretation.

Also speaking this day was Dr. Mary N. Elliott from the National Museum of African American History and Culture and Dr. Tuajanda Jordan, President of St. Mary's College of Maryland. Community members and activists, Dr. Janice Walthour and Dr. Francine Dove Hawkins, officiated at the proceedings. After the ceremony, attendees were able to experience the Slave Cabin exhibit, pouring libation and remembering ancestors. Historic Sotterley is beginning an official descendant registry. If you are or think you are a Sotterley descendant, black, white, enslaved or free from 1699-1960, or even share a common ancestor surname, we would love to hear from you. It was great to see the children so excited to practice their—writing and presentation skills through the authentic real world learning experience of creating a website. Each child was involved in the website building and directing of the presentation.—After completing their presentations to the Sotterley Directors and Managers in the spring, the children were ecstatic to find out that their website would be linked to Sotterley's website. We are very fortunate and grateful for the partnership that the Sotterley Plantation and the STEM 4 and 5 teachers have created and will continue to build upon next year."—Tammy Belisario

This interdisciplinary Field Trip is just another way that Sotterley has managed to create out-of-the-classroom learning experiences for all ages. We are excited to be a part of teaching the next generation the importance of preservation, education and conservation. Thanks to Ms. Tammy Belisario and Ms. Cindy Carpenter for working so closely with our Education Team to bring this dream alive. Ms. Carpenter said,

Through the field experience at Sotterley Plantation we were able to create a project based learning experience for students to have first hand experience extending classroom learning to real life. The abstract concepts of erosion and deposition are often difficult for elementary students to grasp. In October students were just beginning to understand the many natural and human factors impacting erosion and deposition. As their understanding has grown throughout the year, they are now able to critically evaluate the predictions and decisions they made back in October regarding documenting the land. In all my years of teaching I have not witnessed students get this excited about erosion and deposition. Perhaps the greatest benefit of all is they have become much more aware the every day impact humans have on the land and the small decisions the students themselves can make to help care for the earth. STEM 5 will continue to build on this understanding next year.—Cindy Carpenter




